## General Education Program

The General Education Program provides a foundation for analytical discovery, independent thinking, and informed and engaged citizenship.

General Education courses require you to engage the knowledge, perspectives, and methods of specific disciplines while developing essential skills. In so doing, you will increase your understanding of yourself, the natural world, the basis of our society and institution, the larger world, and their relationships. These courses offer the basis for further studies, and continued intellectual growth.

## Graduation Evaluation:

When you have three terms remaining (or when you have completed approximately 75-90 credits), your advisor is to provide the Registration Services Office with the GE and Major evaluation forms you have filled out. An evaluation of your credits toward your program of study which lists your remaining requirements will be done by the Registrar. This evaluation is required to earn a degree. Please remember that in addition to meeting the General Education requirements and the Major requirements, all students must complete a minimum of 120 credit hours, 40 of which must be upper-division (300-499) to earn a bachelor's degree.

## Writing & Mathematics:

Essential skill courses at Western require reading, writing, and mathematics abilities consistent with college entry-level expectations defined by the Colorado Commission on Higher Education.
